Role Explanation

Program Objective

This program aims to develop young legal professionals equipped with the technical and interdisciplinary knowledge required to advance corporate accountability and sustainable business practices. Through a combination of structured learning and hands-on experience, fellows will engage in strategic legal work, policy research, advocacy, and climate finance initiatives. The program bridges corporate legal practice with ecological justice and energy transition governance.

Learning Outcomes

By the end of the program, fellows are expected to:

- 1. Understand corporate legal principles and environmental responsibility in business governance.
- 2. Identify and evaluate laws and regulations impacting climate finance, energy transition, and natural resource governance.
- 3. Conduct legal audits of policies and projects using national and international legal frameworks.
- 4. Draft legal documents such as legal opinions, judicial review petitions, and environmental impact evaluations.
- 5. Collaborate across disciplines and contribute to CELIOS's legal advocacy and policy strategy.
